Work-Study

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How do YOU define a successful work-study program?

- Use allocation (student and institution)
- Meet community service component
- Stepping stone for students future careers
- Helps departments do more with limited budget
- Helps ease financial stress of student
- Networking on campus
- Employer understands main reason for job is for student to get a degree
- Not breaking Federal Regulations
- Students come back year after year to same position

Fed Reg – Are you breaking the rules?

- Complement & Reinforce educational program or career goals
- May not credit to student account without permission
- Does pay equal qualifications
- Working during nonattendance
- Reading Tutor Project or Family Literacy

Student Positions – How are they assigned?

- Given website with list of job and told to apply
- Student Employment Fair
- Informed of eligibility but not automatically awarded
- Orientation and FWS required for each student
- Faculty concerns that student might see a test

Student Positions – What can they entail?

- Meet Fair Labor Standards
- Schools/Institutions Equal Opportunity Standards
- Replacement is interpreted as displacement
- Constructing, operating, or maintaining building for religious worship

Community Service - Where & What?

- Must be in public interest
- Indirect Service
- Must inform student of opportunities
- University or college in not considered community
- On-Campus MAY meet definition

Reading Tutor/Family Literacy

- 100% FWS
- Must have at least one
- Take place in-school, after school, weekends, or summer
- Parochial school limited cases

Timesheet Management

- Must be certified by student's supervisor
- Paper timesheets must have original
- Electronic must meet standards of the E-Sign Act
- Must keep originals for as long as it is required to maintain FISAP
- Must provide Pay Stubs
- Supervisor assures student is not working during scheduled class
